This study examines the availability and affordability of shelter for low-income people living in Pierce County, Washington. It addresses these questions: What has led to reduced affordable housing options, increased homelessness, and escalating evictions in our county?

What efforts are being made to provide “Shelter for All?” Are there practices and innovations that hold promise for Pierce County?

Answers to these questions are presented in the following sections:

1. Key factors about shelter & homelessness in the US, in WA State, and in Pierce County
2. Interventions and outcomes-- current efforts of governmental, faith-based, and other community agencies to address the current crisis of homelessness
3. Innovative ideas and potential solutions --recent innovations and fresh ideas being considered throughout Pierce County
4. A closer look -- additional background and detail regarding sections 1-3 with special attention to historical and social factors (moving parts) related to shelter & homelessness.
